The Rise of the Chinese Communist Party

ABSTRACT:

Using various measures - cadres, martyr soldiers, and guerrilla bases as proxies for the rise of the Chinese Communist Party during the Sino-Japanese War, we find that it grew significantly more in counties occupied by the Japanese Army. We identify three channels behind the CCP's political ascendancy. First, the Communists took advantage of the militarily weaker "puppet troops". Second, they built more grassroots organizations to mobilize support. Last, support for the CCP was powered by a nationalist sentiment spurred by war suffering of various Additionally, war-induced nationalism is more evident today in counties formerly occupied by the Japanese.

James Kung is Sein and Isaac Souede Professor in Economic History at the Faculty of Business and Economics, University of Hong Kong. His research interests are steeped in the political economy of China – both historical and contemporary. James has published in The Quarterly Journal of Economics, The Economic Journal, The Review of Economics and Statistics, The Journal of European Economic Association, American Political Science Review, among others. In 2021 he was President of the Association Comparative Economic Currently he serves on the editorial board of the Journal of Economic History.
