Course Description

This course is open to those who are interested in learning more about Japanese culture and society. Through this course, students can learn about both traditional and contemporary Japanese society and culture, as well as the deeply ingrained relationship between language and culture.

Aims

The main aims of this course are to:

- Introduce Japanese culture to broaden your understanding of the Japanese workplace;
- Acquire critical thinking abilities while gaining an understanding of Japanese culture;
- Cultivate understanding of the intricate connection between culture and language; and
- Offer you a range of activities that will allow you to experience Japanese culture;

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course, you will be able to:

- Investigate and analyse Japan's modern and traditional cultures through a comprehensive presentation, demonstrating critical engagement with cultural themes;
- Explain the foundational elements of the Japanese language, including grammar, vocabulary, and phonetics, and illustrate their significance in communication;
- Describe the historical development and current usage of the Japanese language, and evaluate its evolution within sociocultural contexts;
- Identify the geographical characteristics of Japan and assess how these factors influence cultural practices and language use; and
- Develop critical thinking skills while engaging with Japanese cultures, enabling you to synthesise information and articulate informed perspectives on cultural phenomena.

Indicative Content

A range of self-developed and authentic materials will be used to cater for the needs and interests of the students as well as to maintain a high level of motivation and enjoyment. Activities will be varied and will have traditional as well as contemporary aspects.

Topics will include:

- History and foundations of Japanese language: Linguistic foundations include a unique writing system that reflects centuries of cultural exchange and adaptation.
- Geographical characteristics of Japan: Geographical features, a variety of climates, and frequent natural events that shaped Japanese society.
- Different traditional and contemporary cultural aspects: The coexistence of traditional and contemporary cultural elements in modern Japanese society.
- Trending hobbies in Japan: Popular hobbies in Japan include both traditional activities like ikebana (flower arranging), as well as contemporary pastimes such as gaming, karaoke, and cosplay.
- Food culture in Japan: The emphasis on seasonality, presentation, and fresh ingredients of Japanese cuisine.
- Public events and festivals in Japan: A wide range of public events and traditional festivals (matsuri) throughout the year.

Teaching Method

Students will work on a range of activities either individually or in small groups. After reviewing materials on contemporary Japan issues, group discussions will be conducted to let student express their point of view. The main teaching focus will be on using interactive and learner-centred methods of learning where students are encouraged to use and explore Japanese culture.
