Course Description

The course is the continuation of the JAP1302 course and continues to develop students' ability to use Japanese for communicative purposes and to raise their awareness of Japanese culture. As with JAP1201, JAP1202 and JAP1302, the emphasis is on providing a stimulating and enjoyable learning experience by allowing students to discover and experience this new culture and language.

Furthermore, the course aims at developing students' responsibility for their own learning and encourages them to learn Japanese more independently by completing an independent language learning Portfolio.

The course has been developed with students' instrumental motivation in mind and is aiming to give them a foundation to prepare for Japanese Language Proficiency Test Level N5.

Aims

The main aims of this course are to:

- significantly increase students' vocabulary related to daily life, work, and social interactions;
- enable students to engage in more sophisticated conversations on a variety of topics, including expressing opinions, seeking advice, and making assumptions;
- develop students' ability to read intermediate-level texts, such as short articles and essays;
- guide students in writing more complex sentences and short paragraphs, utilizing new vocabulary and grammar structures;
- further develop students' independent learning skills through the use of the independent learning module.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course, you will be able to:

- engage in conversations about future plans, giving advice, and expressing opinions, while demonstrating an ability to negotiate meaning and adapt language to different contexts;
- read and analyse intermediate-level texts, such as short stories and articles, identifying key themes, main ideas, and supporting details;

- compose coherent paragraphs and short essays that effectively utilise learned vocabulary and grammar, showcasing the ability to organise ideas logically and engage with the audience;
- identify and interpret nuances in spoken language, including tone and intention, to enhance comprehension and responsiveness in conversations;
- apply relevant vocabulary related to everyday activities, travel, and social interactions, demonstrating a practical understanding of language in context; and
- explore and reflect on Japanese culture and customs through language usage, gaining insights that inform your understanding of social norms and practices.

Indicative Content

A range of authentic materials will be used to cater for the needs and interests of the students as well as maintain a high level of motivation and enjoyment.

Topics will include:

- Key Linguistic Features in Japanese: Exploration of essential grammatical structures, including the potential form and volitional form of verbs, to facilitate nuanced expression and intention in communication.
- Conversations about Visiting a Doctor: Role-playing and practical dialogues to navigate medical appointments, including vocabulary related to symptoms, treatments, and health inquiries, enhancing students' ability to communicate effectively in healthcare settings.
- Refusing a Request: Strategies for politely declining requests and offers, emphasizing the use of appropriate language and cultural nuances to maintain social harmony.
- Discussing a project at work: Learning the grammar and vocabulary needed to express opinions, make suggestions, discuss plans, and explain reasons, all of which are essential for discussing a project at work in Japanese.
- Japanese festivals: Watching videos, exploring vocabulary, and reading passages about traditional events or seasonal activities.
- Etiquette: Introducing aspects of Japanese etiquette, such as polite language, expressions for making requests or giving advice, and cultural norms for conversation.
- Social customs: Exposure to Japanese social customs through example dialogues (such as polite ways of speaking and everyday situations in work or daily life)

Teaching Method

Students will work on a wide range of communicative tasks and activities individually, in pairs or in small groups. The main teaching focus will be on using a communicative language teaching methodology and learner-centred methods of learning to encourage students to use and explore the new language for everyday communicative purposes. Since the teaching method will focus on oral communication and helping students to develop their confidence in learning and using Japanese, a maximum class size of 20 will be set.
