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Course Overview

The course introduces students to the nature, measurements, and limitations of major social and economic indicators that have been used internationally to measure and compare socio-economic conditions across societies. After learning commonly used indicators worldwide, students will apply them to assess the social and economic development of Hong Kong.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand and explain the nature, measurements, and limitations of major social and economic indicators;
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of the social and economic conditions of Hong Kong from an international perspective;
- 3. Analyse the status quo and trend of socio-economic development in Hong Kong;
- 4. Possess relevant skills to identify and use social and economic data.

Teaching Method

Lectures combine with tutorials. Lectures provide students with knowledge of major social and economic indicators including how they are used in a global context. In tutorials, students will be divided into groups to make presentations through discussing and analysing the applicability and limitations of selected indicators in

Hong Kong.

Assessment and Measurement of Learning Outcomes

1. Tutorial presentation (25%) (LOs 1-4)

In tutorials, students will be divided into groups to work on the above discussion topics. Each group will choose two topics (one from economic and the other from social indicators), collect and analyse relevant data, and make two presentations (20 minutes for each). Every student is expected to play certain roles in preparing and delivering presentations, while instructors have the right to give different marks to different members of the same group according to their performance. Due dates will be announced in the first class of the course.

2. Presentation reports (25%) (LOs 1-4)

Based on the presentations as well as lectures, each group will draft two presentation reports (one for economic and the other for social indicators). Reports should include the chosen topics; data and methods of analysis; results and implications; and limitations and potential for further investigation. Each report should be no more than 10 pages (exclusive of references and appendices), double-spaced, Times New Roman 12 font with 1-inch margins. In both papers, students need to clarify how each member of the group has contributed to preparing presentations and reports. Due dates will be announced in the first class of the course.

3. Tutorial participation (10%) (LOs 1-4)

Each group will also be responsible for commenting on other groups' presentations. To ensure interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary communication, students will be required to critically assess and give constructive feedback. Instructors have the right to give different marks according to their performance.

4. Final examination (40%) (LOs 1-4)

The final exam consists of essay-type questions assessing students' understanding and skills to handle social and economic data. Students will be required to analyse key indicators and describe characteristics of societies/economies in a scientific manner. Exam date will be announced in due course. This is the chance for students to demonstrate their learning achievement comprehensively.
