Graduate Employment Survey 2014

Summary of Survey Findings

1. Response Rate

In 2014, 689 out of 697 graduates completed and returned the questionnaires, representing a response rate of 98.9%.

2. Employment Status

The overall engagement rate in employment and full-time further studies reached 95.7%. 87.9% of the graduates joined the work force, 7.8% chose to pursue full-time further studies, while 3.3% of the graduates were not seeking employment and 1.0% or 7 graduates were still looking for their first job at the time the survey was conducted.

Graduates from the following programmes were 100% engaged in employment and further studies: BA in Cultural Studies, History, Philosophy and Translation; BBA programmes in Finance, General Business Management, Human Resources Management, Marketing and Risk & Insurance Management; and the streams of Behavioural Science in Modern Society, China and Asian Pacific Affairs, Contemporary Social Issues and Policy and International Studies of the Social Sciences programme.

3. Time Taken in Job Search and Average Number of Job Offers

50.6% of graduates received their first job offer within one month while 24.7% of them got their offers within 1-2 months. By September 2014, 89.7% of our graduates were settled in full-time employment. On average, each full-time employed respondent received 2 full-time job offers.

4. Overall Average Monthly Income

The overall average monthly income of full-time employed graduates was HK\$12,869, representing an increase of 7.2% comparing to 2013's HK\$12,002. Graduates of BBA – General Business Management had the highest average monthly income of HK\$16,813, where graduates from BBA – Risk and Insurance Management came second with an average monthly income of HK\$14,026.

5. Employment Sector

The majority of the full-time employed graduates (75.7%) were employed in the commerce and industry sector, an increase of 1.9% when compared to 2013's 73.8%. The education sector took up 16.2% of our graduates, which is slightly lower than 2013 (17.6%), whereas the community and social services sector employed 5.8% of the 2014 graduates – similar as 2013's 6.0%. The civil service sector employed 1.4%, representing a slight decrease of 0.9% from 2013 (2.3%) whereas the public utilities sector took up the rest of 0.9% of our graduates in 2014.

6. Occupation

The teaching profession absorbed 13.2% of the 2014 full-time employed graduates, while the marketing / sales profession took up 10.7%. Another 10.0% of the 2014 graduates were employed in the administrative / management profession and 9.4% were employed in the accounting / auditing profession.

7. Relevance of Study to Work

Over half of the full-time employed graduates (59.0%) were engaged in a career in the same field or fields relevant to their studies. BBA graduates had a higher percentage (77.0%) of engaging in careers relevant to their studies than those in Arts (55.3%) and Social Sciences (37.8%).

8. Size of Companies

37.8% of the full-time employed graduates were engaged in companies with employees under 100, representing a drop of 5.8% from 2013. 44.6% of the 2014 graduates were employed in companies with 500 or more employees, representing an increase of 6.4% than in 2013. It reflected that our graduates could compete for posts in bigger firms and government departments.
