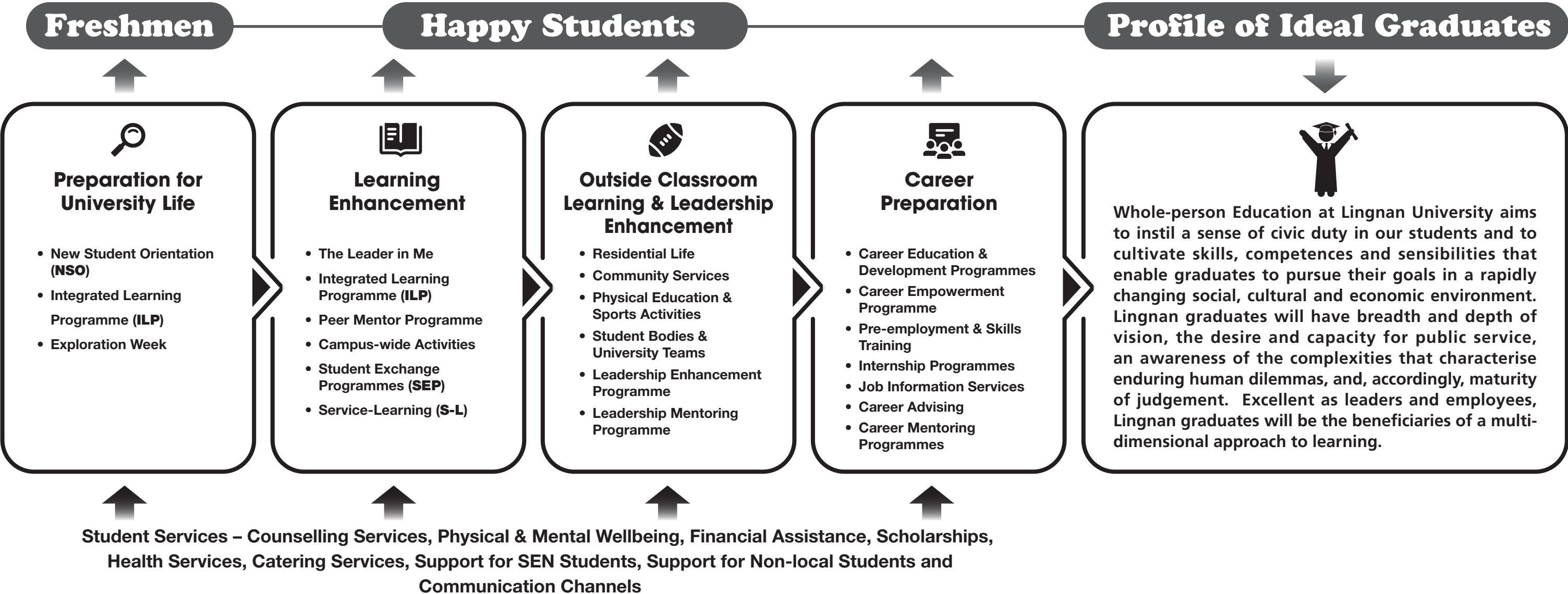

¹ The Senate, at its meeting held on 26 May 2026, approved the adjustment of the minimum required ILP units from 5 units to 3 units under each learning domain, while the total required ILP units remain unchanged. This adjustment is to apply to the new cohorts admitted in 2026-27 and thereafter.

² Once students have met the unit requirement of each learning domain, the additional ILP units will be counted under Free Electives.

³ Students who have participated in and completed an approved Student Exchange Programme (SEP) can acquire an exemption of 7.5 ILP units under Free Electives. For details, please contact the Office of Global Education.

⁴ If students cannot participate in or complete the NSO programme, they are required to obtain ILP units under Free Electives.

Service-Learning: Make an Impact!

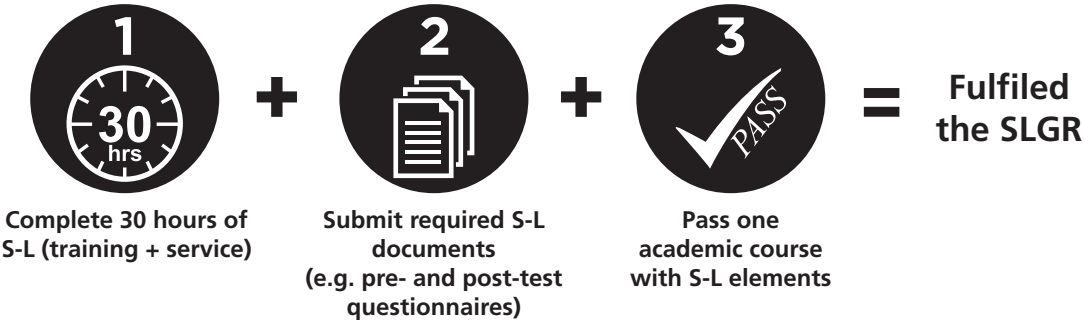

Lingnan Entrepreneurship Initiative

The Lingnan Entrepreneurship Initiative (LEI) provides an array of learning opportunities for students, empowering them to embed innovation and entrepreneurship in their solutions as well as other aspects of their lives. LEI's programmes include:

- I&E Academy: Global Exposure (1 to 2 weeks-long programme in selected overseas country)
- I&E Academy: GBA Exposure (1 to 2 weeks-long programme in GBA)
- Startup Weekend
- Hostel Entrepreneurship Laboratory (co-organised with OSA)
- University Innovation Fellows (year-long programme with a Global Meetup in the Netherlands)
- LEI Tech Apprenticeship Programme (semester-long technical training programme)
- Humanitarian Technology Summer Research (8 to 12 weeks-long programme in selected overseas country)
- Humanitarian Technology Summer Internship (6 weeks-long programme at Lingnan University)
- Joint Humanitarian Entrepreneurship Academy (credit-bearing programme with field work in selected overseas country)

LUXY Lab

“LUXY Lab” is an initiative jointly organised by Lingnan University and Xinya College of Tsinghua University. It aims to promote exchange between students from the two cities, Hong Kong and Beijing. Through a series of seminars and site visits, students will gain deeper insights into the societies, cultural and creative industries, and technological development of regions. The programme encourages students to design cultural and creative products that integrate software and hardware, fostering meaningful academic and cultural exchange.

Programme Highlights

- **Transforming Creativity into Outcomes**
Students receive the knowledge and technical support needed to turn creative ideas into tangible outputs or prototypes of cultural and creative products.
- **Professional Mentorship**
Faculty members and experts from both universities provide comprehensive support, integrating theory with practice.
- **Beijing-Hong Kong Exchange Network**
Students from Lingnan University and Xinya College form cross-institutional teams, learning from one another and building a sustainable Beijing-Hong Kong exchange network. The experience broadens international perspectives and strengthens cross-cultural collaboration skills.

Hands-on practice and activities will take place at Lingnan University and Xinya College of Tsinghua University sequentially in the summer.

Jointly organised by Lingnan University and Yuanpei College of Peking University, the Lingnan-Yuanpei STEM Summer Academy (LYSSA) aims to transform the innovative skills and STEM knowledge of students from both universities into successful businesses. It offers a series of training programmes, including pre-camp workshops and thematic seminars conducted by experienced business leaders and renowned scientists. LYSSA participants can also engage themselves in field trips, cultural excursions, and a competition in Hong Kong and Beijing in alternate years.

Appreciation of Chinese Culture

The “LingArt” Programme on the Promotion and Inheritance of Chinese Culture (LingArt Programme) was launched in the 2023-24 academic year. It aims to promote Chinese culture and showcase its richness and uniqueness.

Objectives of Programme:

- Introduce Chinese cultural arts, including Hong Kong traditions
- Showcase the depth and dimensions of Chinese culture through a series of exchange activities, courses, thematic projects, and study tours to the Chinese Mainland, deepening students’ understanding of this area
- Promote Chinese culture to overseas students, presenting its diverse facets
- Foster local students’ pride in China’s rich and diverse culture and cultivate their sense of national belonging
- Disseminate and inherit Chinese cultural arts through large-scale promotional activities and exhibitions of learning outcomes, reaching the general public

The LingArt Programme consists of three parts, providing students with a comprehensive learning journey to understand, appreciate, and inherit Chinese and local culture.

Part 1: Light Tasting Introduction - One-off Experience

This part offers various one-off activities such as performances, lectures, experiential classes, workshops, guided tours, and visits to cultural institutions. The topics include Chinese arts, literature, traditional crafts, and various festivals, presenting the essence of Chinese culture.

Part 2: Savoury Delights Hands-on Learning - Short-term Training

This part goes beyond mere cognition or appreciation and allows students to have firsthand experiences through training courses in various Chinese cultural disciplines. It also covers the application of emerging Art Technologies and Art Curation in promoting Chinese culture.

Part 3: Diligent Practice

Deep Engagement - Earnest Immersion

This part is designed for students with a strong interest in Chinese culture and potential for development. It includes various study tours and internship opportunities. The former allows students to visit different cultural and artistic institutions to gain an in-depth understanding of specific cultural projects, their background, operation, and prospects. The latter focuses on talent development, aiming to provide students with internships in collaboration with professional organisations, expanding their horizons, establishing connections, and facilitating their long-term development in the industry.

A Must to Know

Learning Guidelines and Academic Regulations

Guidelines for Learning

As a community with emphasis on the Liberal Arts ethos, Lingnan aims to foster in its students, aside from a strong academic foundation, qualities such as a strong sense of social responsibility, mutual respect and consideration. To achieve this aim, students are expected to exemplify behaviour consistent with these values in all facets of their university life – in classrooms, in hostels, in the library, and in all kinds of campus activity. While the freedom and autonomy of individual students are respected, a sense of social responsibility would suggest the following guidelines.

Students should demonstrate respect for academic staff, non-academic staff and fellow students. They are expected to be proactive in the learning process, and develop the following good practices, which are important for successful and effective learning:

1. **Active learning.** Students should be well prepared in mind and body for effective learning. They should be attentive in class, and be actively involved in learning activities, particularly in tutorials, seminars and case discussions. To facilitate active participation and effective learning, it is essential that students make the necessary preparation – for instance, completing the prescribed reading before class to enhance their learning. To thrive in the digital era, students are encouraged to develop digital literacy, utilise technology-enhanced tools (e.g., AI or Generative Artificial Intelligence (GAI) tools, mobile apps, and data analytics), and cultivate self-motivation and a passion for lifelong learning to address contemporary global and local challenges.
2. **Study hours.** For each hour of class contact, the expectation is that students will undertake 2 additional hours of personal study. Personal study may include preparation for in-class activities, completing assignments, and / or revision, etc.
3. **Class attendance.** Attend all scheduled classes and activities. Teachers have prepared the teaching materials for each class according to the course syllabus. It will therefore not be possible for teachers to repeat the materials to students who are absent from a class. Those who are absent have the responsibility to obtain the relevant teaching materials from fellow students / MOODLE and to undertake the make-up work as appropriate. If students feel that some classes are uninteresting, or that the material is beyond their grasp, they should voice their concerns via the relevant channels (e.g. talking to the teachers directly, expressing their views at Mid-Term Online Course Teaching and Learning Enhancement and the Staff-Student Consultation Committee) available for this purpose.

4. **Punctuality.** Students who are late for class will affect the progress of teaching and learning for themselves and their fellow students. Therefore those who are late may, at the discretion of the instructor, be barred from the classroom.
5. **Self-discipline.** Students should refrain from behaviour that adversely affects instructors' teaching and other students' learning, such as talking, chatting, whispering, sleeping, using mobile phones for non-academic activities or eating in class. In the context of digital learning, students are expected to use digital devices and GAI tools responsibly and ethically, adhering to course-specific guidelines on their permitted use, if any.
6. **Personal integrity and academic honesty.** The University is a place of learning. Students should uphold the highest standards of honesty in academics and all university-related activities, including coursework, examinations, and research and should not copy assignments, coursework, projects or dissertations. These acts constitute plagiarism, which will be referred to the Board of Examiners concerned.
7. **Intercultural experience.** Mutual respect is a key to successful intercultural communication. On the occasions with the presence of non-local students, whether in classrooms or in informal interaction, students should be considerate and adopt a common language as far as practicable. A positive, open dialogue is always conducive to cross-cultural learning and intercultural understanding.

Plagiarism

What It Is and How to Avoid It?

Definition and examples adapted from Writing Tutorial Services, Indiana University, Bloomington, IN

What Is Plagiarism?

- Plagiarism is using others’ ideas and words without clearly acknowledging the source of that information

How Can Students Avoid Plagiarism?

- Avoid plagiarism, you must give credit whenever you use another person’s idea, opinion, or theory
- Any facts, statistics, graphs, drawings – any pieces of information – that are not common knowledge
- Quotations of another person’s actual spoken or written words; or paraphrase of another person’s spoken or written words

Generative AI Tools Usage Guidelines

Declaration:

- From Term 2, 2024-25, students may use generative AI (GAI) tools to support their studies unless informed otherwise by their teaching staff
- Students must declare the use of GAI tools in their assignments and assessments using the sample template provided in the “Best Practices for Ethical and Responsible Use of GAI Tools in Course Assessments” (issued by the then Teaching and Learning Centre in Term 1, 2023-24) *The Teaching and Learning Centre was renamed the Centre for Innovative Teaching and Learning w.e.f. 27 May 2026
- Sample Declaration:
 - “I / We (name(s)) declare that Generative AI tool(s) has / have been used to prepare the submitted work for course and assignment / assessment.”

Citation:

- Students should use proper referencing for written assignments, projects, and reports, preferably following APA style or other accepted formats (e.g., Chicago style) as approved by their academic units

Academic Integrity:

- All submitted work must comply with Lingnan University’s examination and coursework regulations, which prohibit plagiarism. Violations will result in serious consequences
- Students must not present GAI-generated work (in part or whole) as their own, as this constitutes a violation of academic integrity
- For assignments where GAI tools are permitted, failure to declare their use will be deemed academic dishonesty
- For assignments where GAI tools are prohibited, submitting GAI-generated work will also be considered academic dishonesty

Potential Biases:

- Students should be aware of potential biases, inaccuracies, intellectual property rights, and limitations of GAI tools. Responsible and ethical use is crucial to maintaining academic integrity

Students Should NOT:

- Directly copy and paste a paragraph without making any changes
- Treat the content generated by GAI as your own work
- Copy the reference list from the online source (including GAI) when using significant data and information
- Use GAI to summarise a report or paragraph without citation to the original source or declare the use of GAI

Unacceptable and Acceptable Paraphrases

Here’s the ORIGINAL text, from page 1 of Lizzie Borden: A Case Book of Family and Crime in the 1890s by Joyce Williams et al.:

- *The rise of industry, the growth of cities, and the expansion of the population were the three great developments of late nineteenth century American history. As new, larger, steam-powered factories became a feature of the American landscape in the East, they transformed farm hands into industrial laborers, and provided jobs for a rising tide of immigrants. With industry came urbanization the growth of large cities (like Fall River, Massachusetts, where the Bordens lived) which became the centers of production as well as of commerce and trade.*

Here’s an UNACCEPTABLE paraphrase that is plagiarism:

- The increase of industry, the growth of cities, and the explosion of the population were three large factors of nineteenth century America. As steam-driven companies became more visible in the eastern part of the country, they changed farm hands into factory workers and provided jobs for the large wave of immigrants. With industry came the growth of large cities like Fall River where the Bordens lived which turned into centers of commerce and trade as well as production.

Plagiarism

What makes this passage plagiarism?

The preceding passage is considered plagiarism for two reasons:

- The writer has only changed around a few words and phrases, or changed the order of the original's sentences
- The writer has failed to cite a source for any of the ideas or facts

If you do either or both of these things, you are plagiarising.

Unacceptable and Acceptable Paraphrases

Here's an ACCEPTABLE paraphrase:

- Fall River, where the Borden family lived, was typical of northeastern industrial cities of the nineteenth century. Steam-powered production had shifted labor from agriculture to manufacturing, and as immigrants arrived in the US, they found work in these new factories. As a result, populations grew, and large urban areas arose. Fall River was one of these manufacturing and commercial centers (Williams 1).

Why is this passage acceptable?

This is acceptable paraphrasing because the writer:

- Accurately relays the information in the original using her own words
- Let her reader know the source of her information

Strategies for Avoiding Plagiarism

- Put in **quotations** everything that comes directly from the text especially when taking notes
- **Paraphrase**, but be sure you are not just rearranging or replacing a few words. Write the idea in your own words without peeking
- **Check your paraphrase** against the original text to be sure you have not accidentally used the same phrases or words, and that the information is accurate
- When using GAI tools, always verify the information and cite appropriately
- Keep records of how GAI tools were used in your work for declaration purposes

Online Tutorial on Plagiarism Awareness

- The online tutorial with videos and exercises is designed to help you understand what plagiarism is, how to avoid it and how to become a better writer. It will take you approximately one hour to finish it with additional materials and resources provided for your further studies at the end of the tutorial. Completion will be indicated by ticking the check-box at the end of the course.
- All research postgraduate (RPg) and taught postgraduate (TPg) students admitted from the 2026-27 intake are required to complete this online tutorial by the end of the first month of their studies in Lingnan. If postgraduate students fail to complete the requirement by the end of the first month of their studies, the Programme Office / Department concerned may delete their courses registered.
- UG students are required to complete this online tutorial ideally by the end of the first year of study or they will be blocked from course registration for the coming academic year.

Sexual Harassment

What Is Sexual Harassment?

The Sex Discrimination Ordinance (“SDO”) defines two forms of sexual harassment:

1. Unwelcome sexual conduct targeting a person

Engaging in the conduct of a sexual nature in relation to a person, where the conduct:

- is unwelcome to that person;
- includes making a sexual advance or a request for sexual favours to the person; and
- a reasonable third person, having regard to all the circumstances, would have anticipated that the person would be offended, humiliated or intimidated by the conduct.

2. Sexual conduct creating a sexually hostile or intimidating environment

Engaging in the conduct of a sexual nature, where the conduct:

- does not have to be directed at a person;
- can be committed alone or together with others; and
- creates a hostile or intimidating environment for another person.

Possible Examples of Sexual Harassment:

- Unwelcome physical contact or actions (for example, deliberately rubbing up against someone’s body, kissing, hugging, etc.)
- Make unwelcome sexual advances
- Comment on other people’s figures
- Constantly ask or insinuate other people’s sex lives
- Circulate objectionable or sexually suggestive materials (email, instant message on a mobile app, etc.)
- Volunteer talks about personal sex life in a group chat

What Can You Do If You Are Sexually Harassed?

1. Speak up and say “no” to the harasser
2. Keep a written record of the incidents, including the dates, time, location, nature (what the harasser has said or done) and your response and feeling, etc
3. Get emotional support and advice from the people you trust

4. Seek help from related organisations
5. Write to the President direct, or through the Office of the President, or through the Lingnan University’s online sexual harassment reporting / complaint channel at <https://www.ln.edu.hk/eoc/sexual-harassment/online-reporting-system>
6. File a written complaint with the Equal Opportunities Commission or institute legal proceedings at the District Court
7. Report to the police if the incident involves potential criminal elements

Personal Data and Privacy Protection

Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance

What Are Personal Information and Privacy?

Personal information is data:

- that relates to a living individual,
- that is practicable to identify a living individual, and
- that is in a practicable form in which one can access to or process of.

Simply put, names, student cards, academic transcripts, Hong Kong identity cards, employment contracts, and medical records are all regarded as personal information. The University collects and keeps certain personal information from its members, but this identifiable information will not be shared with a third party unless prior consent is obtained.

The Six Data Protection Principles (DPPs)

DPP1 – Purpose and Manner of Collection

- For a lawful purpose, in a lawful and fair means
- Avoid collecting excessive data
- Consequence of not providing such data

DPP2 – Accuracy and Duration of Retention

- Personal data should be accurate and up-to-date
- Do not keep personal data longer than necessary

DPP3 – Use of Data

- Data collected can only be used for a specific purpose of collection
- Consent is required for other or new purposes (e.g. direct marketing / transfer, etc.)

DPP4 – Data Security

- Personal data should be protected by appropriate and sufficient safeguards

DPP5 – Openness and Transparency

- The kinds of personal data you hold and purpose for which data is being used
- Communicate externally and internally

DPP6 – Access and Correction

- Provide the channel(s) and rights for data subjects to access and correct their own personal data

Safety Advice

IN CASE OF AN ACCIDENT

Report to the Security Control Room on the Ground Floor of the Wong Administration Building either in person or by telephoning 2616 8000 for assistance. If the condition is serious or involves injury or death, dial 999 for help at the same time to avoid delay in treatment. Keep calm and give accurate information as regards the accident and the exact location, etc.

IN CASE OF FIRE

In the event of a fire, all occupants must follow the appropriate evacuation instructions which are posted in common corridors or office area or teaching venues. Remain calm. Evacuate from the immediately threatened area. Alert persons nearby by shouting “Fire”. Break the fire alarm glass. Make an immediate attack on the fire only if safe to do so. Close doors to isolate fire and smoke. Leave the building using the nearest stairway. Do not re-enter the building until clearance is given.

IN CASE OF GAS LEAKAGE

Remain calm. Evacuate immediately from the threatened area. Extinguish any naked flames. Do not touch any electrical switches. Do not use telephone or mobile phone in the threatened area. Shout to alert persons nearby. Do not re-enter the building until clearance is given.

IN CASE OF INJURIES

Assess the situation. If condition of the injury appears to be serious, dial 999 for an ambulance first. In case of suspected head or spinal injury, do not move the injured person. Do not touch the victim directly with your hands if he / she is suspected of suffering from electrical injury. Victim should be accompanied to hospital by either friends or staff.

IN CASE OF ROBBERY, THEFT OR ATTACK

The person(s) involved or anyone who witnessed the incident in main campus should report the case in detail to the Security Control Room on the Ground Floor of the Wong Administration Building either in person or by telephoning 2616 8000. The person(s) in Lingnan@WestKowloon should report the case in detail to 13/F reception counter either in person or by telephoning 2616 8685.

If safe to do so, remain at the location for assistance. When the security guard arrives, get ready to provide the following information:

- name(s) and address(es) of person(s) reporting the case
- exact date, time and location where the case took place / is discovered
- full particulars of the case
- description of suspect(s), if known
- property stolen or damaged
- injury (if any)

In case of petty crimes like theft of property from students in hostels, the canteen or in sports facilities where management staff can easily be notified, report the case to them as soon as possible.

IN CASE OF LOST AND / OR FOUND PROPERTY

Any property found in main campus should be passed to the Security Control Room on the Ground Floor of the Wong Administration Building. Any property found in Lingnan@WestKowloon should be passed to the 13/F reception counter.

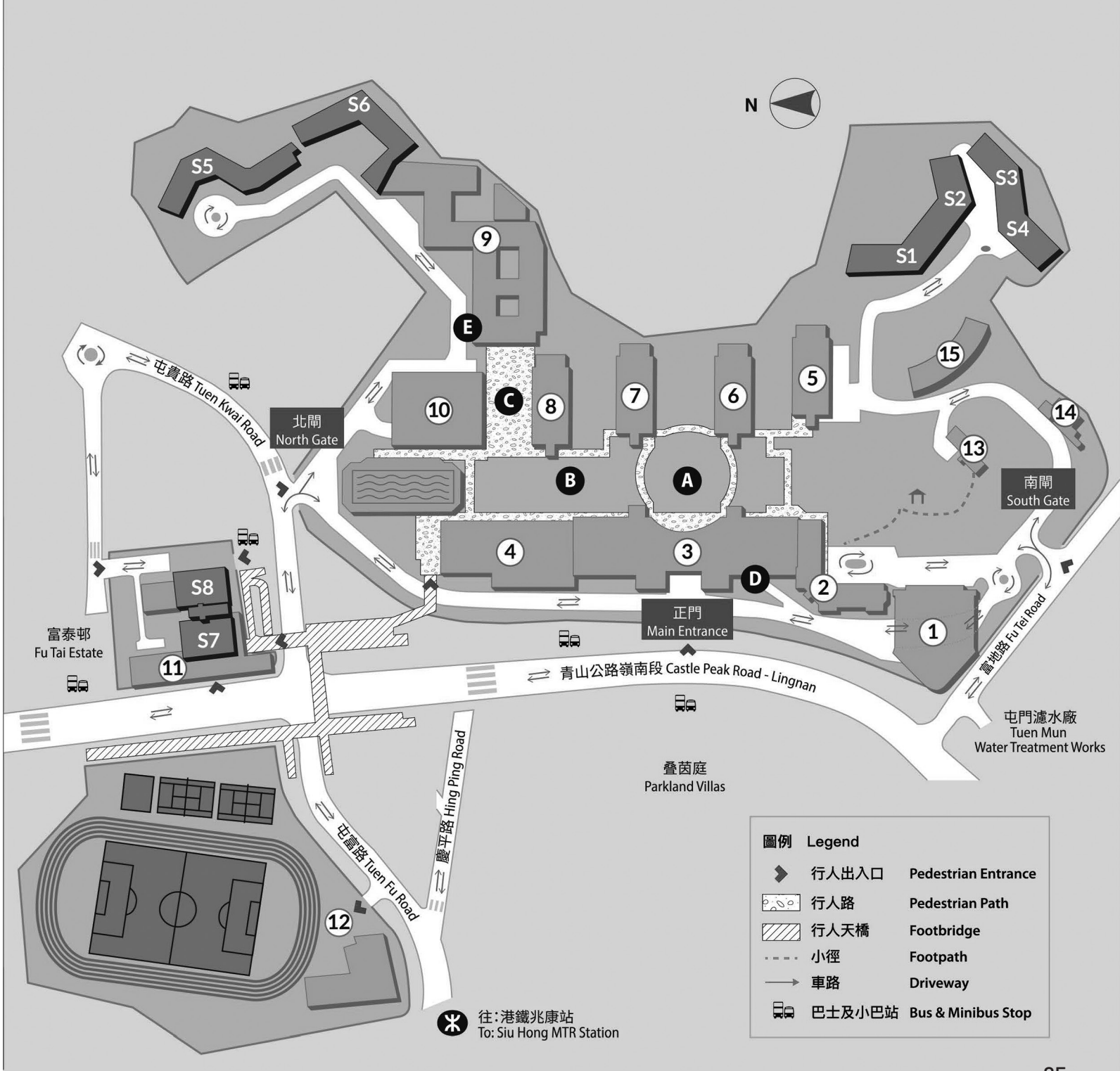
