

Important Information on Academic Advising

You are required to input your Study Plan for Term 1 and Term 2, 2023-24 via DegreeWorks before Online Course Registration (i.e. 22 August 2023 for Year 2 entry / 23 August 2023 for Year 1 entry). You should refer to the DegreeWorks User Guidelines for Academic Advising and make sure that your plan on DegreeWorks is saved. If you have not completed academic advising procedures successfully, you cannot register courses for Term 1 and Term 2, 2023-24 during the Online Course Registration.

The Registry has pre-assigned some courses for all Year 1 entry students in the study plan. **Do not change the pre-assigned courses in your study plan.** You can select the remaining courses that you wish to take in Term 1 and Term 2, 2023-24 from the course offering list (2 courses each term) and **type the course codes of the remaining courses in your study plan.**

Year 2 entry students would not receive any pre-assigned courses. **In case you do not have any pre-assigned courses in the study plan, you should type the course codes of all courses that you wish to take in your study plan.**

The Study Plan on DegreeWorks is not an enrollment record, but a tentative plan indicating the courses that you wish to take. You are reminded to register for the courses during the Online Course Registration. The actual enrollment in a course is subject to the availability of places at the time of course registration. If the selected courses in your study plan are full during the Online Course Registration, please consider registering other courses.

You are reminded to register for the University-wide required courses and Social Sciences Foundation Courses during the Online Course Registration if the courses have not been pre-registered. You are assigned to take two courses in the Common Core (i.e. CCC8011 Critical Thinking: Analysis and Argumentation and CCC8012 The Making of Hong Kong), and you are advised to complete the Social Sciences Foundation Courses in your first year. **You are not advised to drop the pre-registered courses during the Online Course Registration.**

Notes for Non-HKDSE Students and Non-JUPAS Students

Under the English Language Enhancement (ELE) Curriculum, students will be grouped under two streams and they are required to complete four ELE courses before graduation. Group A students are those who obtained level 3 in HKDSE English or equivalent while Group B students are those who obtained level 4 or above in HKDSE English or equivalent. Students are encouraged to take their first required ELE course (i.e. LUE1001 University English I for Group A Students and LUE1002 University English II for Group B Students) in First Term of Year 1. For non-HKDSE students and non-JUPAS students who have obtained HKDSE Level 4 or above or equivalent in English Language, you have to submit an application for course exemption of LUE1001 University English I. Notes for Non-Local and Non-Chinese Speaking Students

For non-local students with varied language backgrounds who may not be fit in the required Chinese Language courses (i.e. LCC1010 Chinese Communication I and LCC2010 Chinese Communication II), you have to take note of the notification from the University regarding the relevant arrangements. Notes for Late-admitted Students who Receive an Offer After 17 August 2023 and Students who Miss the Online Registration on 22/23 August 2023

Late-admitted students who receive an offer after 17 August 2023 and students who miss the Online Registration on 22/23 August 2023 are required to **complete academic advising and save your study plan before registering for your courses for Term 1, 2023-24 during the Term 1 Add/Drop Period (i.e. 29 August - 7 September 2023)**. Please be reminded to register for the University-wide required courses and Social Sciences Foundation Courses during the Add-Drop Period if the courses have not been pre-registered for late-admitted students.

Course Checklists

In order to graduate, you are required to complete 120 or more credits of courses as stipulated in the programme curriculum with a minimum cumulative GPA of 1.67. The programme curriculum is subject to changes and updates from time to time. For the checking of your fulfilment of the requirements of your Major/Minor/Concentration, please refer to your DegreeWorks records and the curricular requirements set out in the Programme Structures of your intake year (<https://www.ln.edu.hk/reg/undergraduate-programmes/programme-structure#boss>). A Year 1 student admitted to the BSocSc Programme in 2023-24 shall refer to the curriculum for 2023 Year 1 intake, while a student who is admitted as a Year 2 student in 2023-24 should follow the programme structure of 2022 Year 1 intake.
